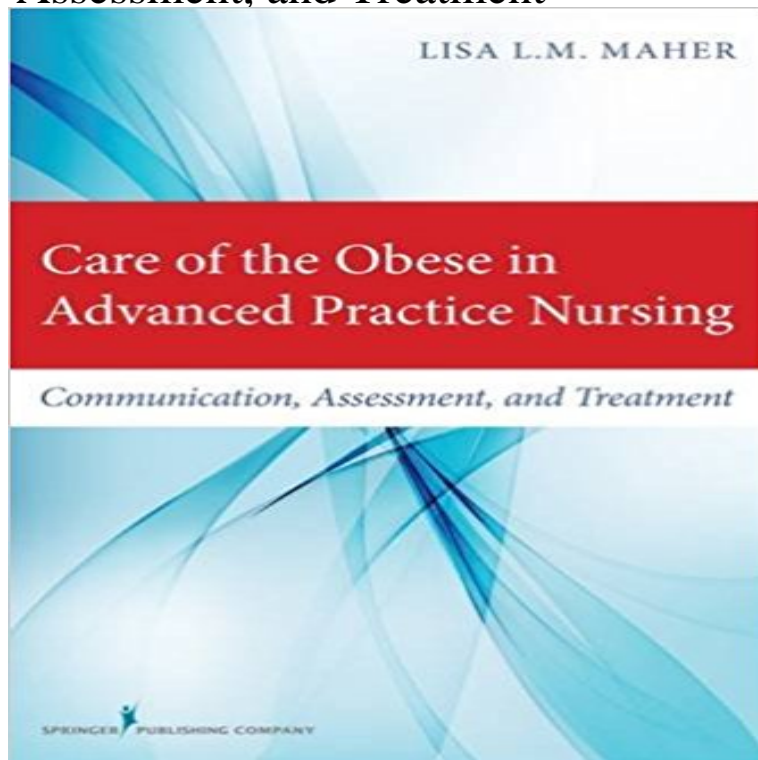


Care of the Obese in Advanced Practice Nursing: Communication, Assessment, and Treatment
